About Sexual Harassment, Abuse, and Assault

Sexual harassment, abuse, and assault happen in every community and affect people of all genders and ages. Sexual violence is any type of unwanted sexual contact, including words and actions of a sexual nature against a person's will and without their consent. A person may use force, threats, manipulation, or coercion to commit these acts.

Stats at a Glance

- One in five women in the United States experienced completed or attempted rape during their lifetime.¹
 Nearly a quarter of men in the U.S. experienced some form of contact sexual violence in their lifetime. This includes rape, being made to penetrate someone else, sexual coercion, or unwanted sexual contact.²
- Nationwide, 81% of women and 43% of men reported experiencing some form of sexual harassment and/ or assault in their lifetime.³
- Forty percent of rapes and sexual assaults were reported to police in 2017, but only about 25% were reported to police in 2018.⁴
- The 2019 <u>Campus Climate Survey on Sexual Assault and Sexual Misconduct</u> found that, at 33 of the nation's major universities, almost one in four undergraduate women experienced sexual assault or misconduct.⁵
- The prevalence of false reporting for sexual assault crimes is low between two percent and 10 percent.⁶
