Issue: At what age can a child refuse a forensic exam and the SANE honors this choice?

California (Sacramento)

- California Family Code Section 6927 and 6928 states: Minors, 12 years of age and older, may give consent to the provision of medical care related to the diagnosis or treatment of a sexual assault and the collection of evidence.
- The general policy for the Sacramento SART is if a person, regardless of age, declines an evidentiary exam it is not performed.
- Exams are not forced on a child.
- The legal age to consent/decline is 12 year.

Maryland (Military)

- We do not force children to have exams.
- However, we play with them, let them see the equipment we use (video/photo/colposcope), allow them to feel comfortable in the environment in the exam room and most of them will allow us to do the exams.
- Last week I had a four year old who, when I was done, said, "That was fun, can we do it again."
- Having a genital examination in children does not have to be scary if it is done the right way, in the right location (not a busy ER), and with caring, gentle providers.

New York (Suffolk County)

- We are called for all acute exams regardless of age.
- ANY patient, adult or child, may stop the exam at anytime.
- We all put forth extra effort and allow time to complete a pediatric exam...using coloring books, toys, breaks between portions of the exam or anything that will promote the cooperation of the child.
- No child is ever held or forced to undergo an exam against his/her will.
- Occasionally you will have a child who becomes distraught and refuses an exam, but that is uncommon in our experience and we will not examine them if they are that upset.
- I would never force a child to have a sexual assault exam. This is considered unethical in many healthcare arenas.
